




VISION

Navigating the Nave The Rector's Reflections

An aspirant among us I am delighted to welcome to the All Saints' community Mr. Andrew Cooper. Andy is discerning a call to ordained ministry. At the start of the discernment journey the Diocese invites aspirants to a *Diocesan Discernment Year* "DDY" to test their call in a setting outside their own sponsoring congregation. Andy will be with us this program year beginning November 27, the First Sunday in Advent. He will join us in a variety of roles and ministries. Please introduce yourself to him. We'll have a discernment committee that will meet regularly with Andy to pray and discern alongside him. See page 10 for a note from Andy.

Healing Station I wrote in the September GOOD NEWS that we would be beginning a new ministry of healing during the 10:00 a.m. service soon. The "soon" is now. Beginning All Saints' Sunday, November 6, 2022, there will be a healing station at the side chapel during the distribution of communion.

How it works: during communion, if you wish to receive prayers and anointing for healing for yourself or someone you know, please come to the side chapel (either before or after receiving communion). Briefly let the anointer know what and for whom you are seeking healing. The anointer will offer a short prayer over you then make the sign of the cross with unction (holy oil) on your forehead. If you would like a longer conversation about healing, the anointer can meet with you following the service.

Occasionally the number of people seeking anointing prayers may take a bit longer than the distribution of communion. When that happens, the Gathered will sit in silent prayer until all have been anointed or made arrangements to be anointed after the service ends.



on Market Street between University and 14th, join in this community's 19th annual celebration of the **Day of the Dead**. Visit the magnificent altars constructed in White



Park to honor loved ones. There will be art, dance performances, live music, stunning costumes, and food.

Tuesday, November 8, is the last day to submit your ballot for the **General Election**. All those registered to vote in California should have already received a voteby-mail ballot. The ballot includes seven propositions, plus

- Statewide candidates for U.S. Senate, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner, Member of State Board of Equalization, State Superintendent of Public Instruction
- U.S. Representative in Congress, State Senator, State Assembly Member
- Supreme Court Justices, as well as other local candidates and local measures.

You can return your ballot by mail or in person to various locations.

Check out these two sources of non-partisan information: the League of Women Voters' guide at https://easyvoterguide.org/, and Voters' Edge at https://votersedge.org/ca. The official source of election information is the California Secretary of State, https://www.sos.ca.gov/

Voting is one of the ways we get to speak our values into the processes of government. Do not overlook this opportunity to have a voice.

Tuesday, November 8, anytime 5-9pm PST, join in for Election Day Prayers online, hosted by the Episcopal Church Office of Government Relations. Tune in via the Office of Government Relations Facebook page https://www.facebook.com/TheEPPN, or the Episcopal Church Facebook page https://www.facebook.com/episcopalian.

"We welcome everyone as we reflect on this key process of our common life and on the importance of fair elections for our democracy," said Rebecca Linder Blachly, director of the Office of Government Relations. "We hope many voters will join us that day to pray for our leaders, neighbors, and country."

Monday, November 14, 7-8pm, Madison Street Church will host Taizé Meditative Worship, an ecumenical style of worship that uses silence, repetitive chanting and thought-provoking readings to encourage a deep reflective experience of the presence of God. Several Riverside churches have joined together to provide this worship opportunity to the community on the second Monday of every month.



Madison Street Church, a Brethren in Christ community, is located at 3991 Madison Street, near Arlington. If you haven't been there before, it's a little hard to find. Look for the sign on the street, and turn into the driveway.

All Saints' Outreach team continues to participate in the St. Michael's **Food Share** ministry each Thursday morning. Recently, St. Michael's added a short, modified service of Holy Eucharist before Food Share begins; sharing the Food of Life before sharing food for life. Mother Mary Crist and our own Deacon Ryan

share officiant duties for this special service. On average there are about 35-40 participants. at one recent Thursday Food Share Eucharist there were over 60 participants! This is but one of the growing ways St. Michael's, St. George's and All Saints' are sharing mission and ministry.

The number of those in need continues to grow as the economy worsens. We are starting to prepare for an increasing need which will certainly happen when the 100 housing units for homeless and low income open in mid November, located right behind Saint Michael's. We are going to need more volunteers from All Saints' to help our friends from St. Michael's in the coming months. Please email or text me if you can help.

Keep those recycled plastic bags coming...just leave them in Smith Hall and I'll pick them up after Sunday services. Used clothing, bedding and shoes are always welcome as donations. They are provided free of charge to St. Michael's guests. Also coats and blankets are needed for the homeless as the cold weather starts creeping in.

Dia de los Muertos

When I first moved to Riverside in 1976, I came to notice something I had never seen before, when living in rural Illinois or in the urban Northeast. As I drove past Olivewood Cemetery, I noticed families sitting on the grass by familiar gravesites, gathering for a meal with their lost loved ones. Some days there would only be a family or two. But over religious holidays especially, dozens of graves would be highly decorated with flowers and family memorabilia, as larger groups of friends and family gathered together, celebrating and mourning the ones they loved. Over Christmas, seeing children in the gravesite presence of a lost parent or relative was especially poignant. I marveled at the sight but was still too inexperienced to fathom it.

Decades later, when my beloved school teacher and fellow Benedictine oblate Bill Wood died, he left his body to a medical school for dissection. As he had told me, he wouldn't be there anymore. Whenever I returned to my hometown, there was nowhere to go to remember him by. His house was sold. A local street and a school had been named after him, but he wasn't there. Fortunately, the town mayor was also close to Bill and had the compassionate idea to purchase a gravesite and a gravestone, to commemorate him. When I next returned to Batavia, the mayor took me to Bill's grave. I had a long visit with Bill, under the autumnal foliage. It was then I finally grasped the importance of gravesites or gravestones to commemorate those we love.

I once had a heartfelt conversation with a UCR student from Taiwan who told me that the PRC had finally opened China to the Taiwanese Chinese. This meant that her family could finally return to the mainland to sweep the graves of their ancestors, overcoming the deep family shame they all had felt for so many decades when they were excluded from visiting the graves of their ancestors.

It is a similar gift our Mexican immigrants teach us in Riverside as we celebrate the Day of the Dead. With displays of family pictures, foods, and memorabilia, loved ones stay alive in the hearts of their survivors because they remain tangibly remembered. The 2017 film *Coco* captured this so well.

There are thousands of remembered images, of reminiscences we accumulate in the course of a single lifetime of those we've loved. Once we open out our memories of occasions spent with a precious person or a pet, bittersweet and fleeting images flood our remembrances of times spent together. Every now and then, often in the night, a long-forgotten image reappears to me. How could I ever have forgotten that morning we spent together, that hike we took together, that perfect conversation? The Día de los Muertos, or All Soul's Day, calls us home, never to forget.

Laundry Love Riverside was very busy at our event on Wednesday October 19th. We spent a total of \$485.26 and



lended the night with a balance of \$15.15. We had 11 volunteers, including 3 new volunteers. **Welcome Eva**, **Jewell and Brad!**

We had several returning customers waiting for us to start at 6:00 PM. Nearly all of the washing machines were available to the start of the evening. By 6:15 PM all machines were running! We needed all 11 of our volunteers as we served nearly 40 families. Fortunately, clients only had to wait approximately 15-20 minutes to get their laundry loaded in the washing machines as we had a steady stream of clients all evening. Our new volunteers did a wonderful job as they were trained by our existing volunteers following a brief orientation. All evening, the new volunteers told me, "I love this! I'll be back again next month!"

We passed out Halloween candy at the Laundry Love table for the young and young at heart.

We had a few new clients from Path of Life. They mentioned that they heard about LLR from Path of Life and wondered if they could get their laundry done for free. Remember the Spanish speaking woman with her family that I spoke to last month? She was there on Wednesday night and she asked if we had anything else to give away. She asked for clothing, diapers, etc... I told her that this month all we had was Halloween candy. I reminded her that our "give aways" are based on donations and we cannot guarantee that we will have something to give away each month. In speaking with her the past two months, I'm reminded of the desperate need some families have with basic supplies. Our goal for Laundry Love has always been to support the community... with their laundry and more! God willing, we will be able to provide outreach services and supplies on a regular basis for our LLR clients.





- -COVID cases in California peaked in June and has declined since. As of September 22, no new cases or hospitalizations have been reported.

- -There will be a CPR class here on October 8th. All Ushers, Lay Leaders, Sunday School and Youth volunteers are encouraged to take this class. The cost is \$45 per person. If this presents a problem, see Mother Kelli Grace.

- -We have received the corrected final audit report from Smith Marion, and it is ready for review and approval
- -Despite the decline in the value of investments and continued uncertainty in the markets, our reserves are acceptable.
- -May and June congregational giving was reduced, but bounced back in July. Pledges are below budget partially due to pledges that will not be received because of deaths. In reviewing plegers and gift through Mid-September, I believe that most of the shortfall will ultimately be contributed.
- -Practice the Tithe receipts were \$11,333, almost \$4,000 oer what we anticipated.
- -Donations from funerals and other sacramental services continue to exceed expectations, as do memorial gifts.
- -Expenses are over budget. Budget is tight but we are OK.
- -It is not a good time for the Mortgage Refinance Committee renegotiate our mortgage on Rectory and Inspire House.
- -In November we will explore renegotiation with Provident.

4. Endowment Committee - Jeannene Kelly

- -Written report submitted by Kurt Marcks, Chair. The Endowment Committee suggests changes to the Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines: add the church treasurer as an ex-officio member (non-voting) to the committee. *The full document Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines is on file*)
- -The process of amending the document calls for a vote of at least two-thirds majority of the Vestry at two regularly scheduled meetings. The congregation must be informed within one week after the first meeting. *M/S Johnson/Korzec* that we accept and approve amendments to the Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines. *Carried* (unanimously)
- -Jeannene reviewed each of the funds overseen by the Endowment Committee

The Kairos Mission and Ministry Fund (invested at the Episcopal Church Foundation)

This is the default fund to receive unrestricted bequests left to All Saints'. It is a quasi-endowment managed with the intent on preserving the principle, but can be accessed by the Vestry in cases of significant need.

The All Saints' Foundation (invested at The Diocesan Investment Trust)

This is a true Endowment, begun in 2016 with a \$10,000 gift from Fr. John Conrad and Shannon Murphy. Numerous small donations have since been made to the fund. The fund is designated for specific use and the principle cannot be touched.

-The committee recommends disbursement of \$1,200, as per Policies and Guidelines direct.

M/S Woodbury/Varner that we accept the Endowment Committee report and approve disbursement of \$1,200.

The Vestry Reserve Fund (invested in the Balanced Fund of the Episcopal Church Foundation)

This fund opened with church reserves in 2021, and includes an anonymous gift of \$100,000 as seed money to hire a curate. This fund is followed by, but not overseen by the Endowment Committee.

5. Families, Children and Youth - Leslie Sunderland

- -Sunday School is going really well. Some Sundays have had 25 in attendance. The average is ten or so. Smitha Jetti would like to take on more Sundays.
- -Youth Group meets twice a month under the direction of Jim Boyer. This last week the program focused on privileges influencing our everyday decisions and activities.
- -Families with Small Children continues to meet online, but a potluck is being planned to meet and share ideas in person.

6. Community Health - Kathy Woodbury

- -COVID cases are still down, but the reality may be that cases are not being reported. Mask and stay home if not well.
- -There have been 198 cases of Monkeypox, 98% of those being male. There is a vaccine available.

7. **Hospitality** - Kathy Woodbury

- -Oktoberfest was a great success. We had 60 people attending. Ian and youth made the pretzels, Many hands pitched in to decorate, set up, cook, and cleanup. It was suggested that we purchase a second tank to have on hand. We had \$850 in donations, but still have to cover expenses.
- -We have a full calendar for November and December: All Souls Lantern Festival, All Saint's Potluck, Peggy Rose Memorial, Consecration Sunday, Christmas Extravaganza, Advent Lessons and Carols, Blue Christmas, and Christmas services, lots of opportunities to participate.

8. Outreach - Patricia Korzec

- -Laundry Love continues. Our clients always show up and are appreciative. We can always use volunteers.
- -Patricia will check with Jim Boyer about Christmas outreach to Path of Life, Inspire, and Giving Tree. Mother Kelli Grace suggested we include Family Promise this year

9. Finance - Jane Carney

a. Current Financial Report

- -Pledge Revenue: While we are in the red \$3,000, year-to-date results are better than anticipated in the budget.
- -The audit interview committee continues to explore options for future audits.
- -The committee formed to look into the refinancing of our existing mortgage will begin talking to lenders in November.
- -All Saints' received \$13,000 from the Carnegie School bankruptcy

b. Budget Committee for 2023

- -Budget Committee will have a draft preliminary budget to present to the Vestry at the November meeting.

- -The Stewardship Committee has met several times in preparation for Stewardship 2023.
- -The theme is More than Enough from The Episcopal Stewardship Network TENS.org
- -November 6 30-45 second videos will be gathered from members addressing the prompt "At All Saints' I can see God ."
- -Stewardship Campaign will end on November 20, Consecration Sunday, with a brunch provided by the Youth Group.

11. Senior Warden - Francie Johnson

- -Looking forward to composing Stewardship letter to go out in November.
- -Francie worked with Steve in installing a door as a noise barrier in the north wing.

- -We are looking for ways to recruit new Vestry members.

12. Junior Warden - Steve Slaten/Luke Polling

- -The lease with Inspire Life Skills Training for the white house has been renegotiated, with an annual 2% increase. (copy of lease is on file) Inspire requested a gate between house and church parking lot. There were also concerns about the addition of a community garden on the site (a gate will be added behind the garage to access the garden). If a proposal for RCC low income housing comes about, Inspire requests that we go to a month to month agreement *M/S Varner/Johnson* that the Vestry approve the First Amendment to Residential Lease All Saints' Episcopal Church, Riverside, Landlord Inspire Life Skills Training, Tenant. *Carried*
- -Sheldon's Air Conditioning performed regular maintenance, but there is a problem with a leak in the kitchen. Repair to cost \$1,000. We may need to get a second opinion, look into new sources for repair and maintenance.
- -PRECIS Solar has provided another option for solar on our campus. It would entail a shade structure over the labyrinth and part of the lawn with panels on structure. It would require no changes to the tile roofing as other estimates do.
 - -All Saints' hosted a Care of Creation forum on October 11th, with 40 or so attendees.
- -Ongoing projects continue: installation of smart thermostats, continuation of water-wise landscaping, preparing two offices in the south wing for tenant use, painting of interior and exterior, replacement of hot water source in south wing.

13. Rector's Report - Mother Kelli Grace Kurtz

- -Mother Kelli Grace had lunch with Roy and Enor Harris, Roy has resigned as head usher after 40 years. He has suggested Leslie Sunderland as his replacement. We graciously accept his resignation and express our gratitude.
 - -We have two baptisms on November 13th.
- -Andy Cooper, aspirant to the priesthood, will be spending the program year at All Saints'. His first Sunday will be November 27
- -Executive Director of Mercy House, the nonprofit that manages St. Michael's Apartment Complex and DeAnza Veterans Housing is developing an advocacy committee in each County. He has asked Mother Kelli Grace to be on the Riverside County committee. The committee may be interested in south wing office space.
- -We have four Vestry members rotating off in December. The nominating committee will be made up of the Junior and Senior Wardens and two members of the parish. A recruitment notice will be posted in Sunday paper and the Good News. Slate will be presented to Vestry at the December meeting for approval.
- -Hold the date, late January near MLKing Day for the ordination to the priesthood of Deacon Ryan Macias.

- -Deacon Ryan is excited by all that is going on in the parish.
- -He will present a Dia de los Muertos workshop on November 5th.
- -We have many new people attending so he is looking into beginning an Enquirer's Class.
